Alarms

There are smoke and carbon monoxide alarms on every	
level of the home	
There are smoke and carbon monoxide alarms outside the	
sleeping areas	
You test all alarms once a month	
Batteries are replaced yearly if your alarms are not sealed	
You can hear all alarms in the home, especially in sleeping	
areas	
Everyone knows what the alarms sound like and what to do	
when they go off	
Alarms are not older than life expectancy.	
Smoke alarms: 10 years and Carbon Monoxide: 7 years	

*Check manufacturer's instructions on alarm installation, testing,

maintenance and replacement requirements.



Basement

Electrical panels is clear of obstructions	
Furnace and hot water tank are clear of obstructions and	
combustibles	
The furnace room stores no flammables	

Escape Planning

ALL family members know and practice the fire escape plan	
Everyone knows what to do once a fire starts, including	
who helps children, older adults and pets	
Everyone knows two exits from each bedroom or sleeping	
area	
All windows in sleeping areas are easily opened by all	
family members	
Entrances are free and clear of obstacles	
Overnight guests are aware of the home escape plan and	
meeting place	
Everyone knows to get out and stay out.	
Everyone knows to call 9-1-1 in an emergency from a safe	
phone outside the residence	

Living Area

Cracked / worn electrical cords are replaced as needed	
Electrical outlets are never overloaded	
Wires or electrical cords do not run under carpets / rugs	
Extension cords are not used as permanent wiring	
Gas and / or wood fireplaces have screens	
Non-glass barriers are in place around fireplaces to protect	
young children	
Wood fireplace chimneys are cleaned as required by	
manufacturer instructions, usually annually	
Wood burned is well seasoned (dry)	
No combustible objects are near the fireplace or wood	
stove	
Floors and walls are protected with non-combustible shields	
Portable heaters are away from doorways, combustibles	
and high-traffic areas	
Gas appliances are inspected annually	
Wood fireplace chimneys are cleaned as required by	
manufacturer (minimum annually)	
Wood for burning is well seasoned (dry)	
Electronics have airspace to prevent overheating	
Hallways are clear of obstructions	
Candles are extinguished when you leave the room or LED	
battery-operated candles are used.	

Kitchen

Cooking is never left unattended	
Everyone knows not to open the oven or microwave door if	
there is a fire	
Everyone knows not to put water on a grease fire	
Lids readily available when cooking to put on a fire	
Check for cracked / worn electrical cords on appliances	
Countertop appliances are unplugged when not in use	
Curtains and towels are clear of heat sources	
Fire Extinguisher near the kitchen	
Stove top is not used for storage	

Garage

Gasoline is stored in an approved container in the shed,	
NOT in the garage	
Drivers know NOT to idle the vehicle in an attached garage	
Used rags are stored in a metal container with a tight-	
fitting lid	
A BC class fire extinguisher is located in the garage	
Garage is kept clear of sawdust/wood shavings	
Always allow equipment to cool before refueling	
Only use approved fuel containers, filling to maximum 90%	
to allow room for expansion	

Other

Matches and lighters are always out of the reach of children	
Important papers (e.g. documents, identification,	
heirlooms) are in a fire-resistant safe	
Oxygen in the home is reported to 705-472-1221	

Outside the home

Cigarettes are never extinguished in planters, on grass, in	
peat moss or mulch, or just thrown	
Barbeques and firepits are a safe distance from the house	
and from combustibles (siding, decks, etc.)	
Children stay a safe distance from barbeques and firepits	
Firepits are never left unsupervised	
There is no debris or dead vegetation near the house	
Trees are pruned and thinned to reduce fuel potential	
Woodpiles are stacked away from the house	
Branches hanging over or touching the roof are trimmed	
back
